7th of the 3rd Month 1834, (produced one), which was approved.
It was directed to be signed by the Clerk, and forwarded.
And is as follows, viz:

To the Meeting for Sufferings in London.
Dear Friends,

We have received your interesting and
acceptable communication on the Subject of Slavery,
addressed "To the several Meetings for Sufferings in America",
dated the 7th of the 3rd Month 1834.

The Christian views and sympathy therein expressed,
have been cordial to our feelings.

We hope to be directed by best wisdom, and enabled
to act faithfully and discreetly, in this important
concern: and fervently desire, that we may be strength-
ened to embrace every right opening to plead the cause
of the oppressed African, & a duty which we cannot
consider ourselves discharged from, until Slavery ceases
to exist amongst us.

It is a source of rejoicing and encouragement to us
to be informed that this evil has been abolished throughout
the British West India Colonies; an event which will
we hope tend, in some degree, to promote the Cause of
Emancipation generally, & a Cause, which we believe is
gradually, and steadily advancing in the United States.

The Committee on the Request of the late Sarah Lane
were continued.

The Committee appointed to take charge of 50 Copies
of the Bible received from Friends in Great Britain were
continued.

George Williamson on behalf of the Committee who were
directed to present the Memorial to the General Assembly, on
the subject of abolishing Lotteries in the State of Maryland,
Reported, that a part of their number attended to the duty
assigned them, and that the Memorial met with a favorable
reception. The Committee were continued.

Joseph King Esq. on behalf of the Committee appointed to collect
voluntary Contributions to aid our brethren in North Carolina in
relation to the People of Colour under their care, Reported, that
a Letter had been received from Mr. Hubbard dated 1 Mo. 16. 1835,
wherein he acknowledges the kindness of Friends in raising the
sum stated, with information that it is expected to be drawn
for early this Spring. The Committee were continued.
