The object of the Meeting, as stated in the several minutes of appointment, is "to consider the interests of the Freedmen in connection with the action of the U.S. Government, and of their rights and privileges in the re-organization of the State Governments interval in rebellion;" "and to take such action as way may been for, in endeavoring to secure justice to the Freedmen, and the mantalnance of their rights."

After a time of solemn silence, followed by vocal prayer, the Conference or ganized by the appointment of Charles F. Coffin as Clerk.

Memorials to Congress which had been adopted by the Meetings for Sufferings of Indiana and Western Yearly Meetings, were also presented and read, and the views of those meetings fully explained. The Conference was also informed that lows Meeting for Sufferings had adopted a similar memorial, but that it was not yet present.

The Friends present then entered into a consideration of the subject, and after ree interchange of sentiment, and a full report of facts in reference to the Freeda free interchange of sentiment, and a full report of facts in reference to the Freedmen, it was she united judgment that the present is an important and interesting period in the condition of the colored people in the United States, there being an apparent disposition on the part of many, in the States recently in rebeilion, to regain their power with the evident intention of preventing the dissemination of education and intelligence among those intelly in slavery, and of not awarding to them their natural rights and privileges, and, if possible, reducing them again to a condition of partial bondage or apprenticeship. Congress not having yet accepted the constitutions of the recently reorganized States, or admitted their members to a seat, this Conference believes it especially desirable that our religious society should be heard before Congress as soon as practicable in reference to the rights of the colored population; and in order that Friends may unitedity speck the same language, it is thought best to prepare a Memorial to Congress embracing our views.

The Conference unites in appointing Benjamin Tatham, Charles F. Coffin, James C. Thomas, William Cattell, Eleazar Bales and Enoch Hoag to prepare such Memorial if way opens for it, and report at a future sitting.

Coffin, Eleazar Bales and Enoch Roag to have the Memorial printed and attend to the presentation thereof to Congress. to seek an interview with the appropriate Committees, call upon the members individually as they may have opportunity, and extend such other care in furtherance of the concern as way may open for. They are directed to report to their respective Meetings for Sufferings such facts as may seem appropriate.

They are also directed to send a copy of the Memorial, and an arenust of our proceedings to the Meetings for Sufferings in New England and North Carolina, neither of which, we are informed, received notice of this Conference in season to be convened and participate in it.

Thankful to our Heavenly Pather for the unity, harmony and fellowship in the Gospel, which has perraded during our sittings, and with a feeling of love toward each other, the Conference adjourned.
