"To the Meeting for Sufferings: The Committee upon the Colored population, report: We have continued to co-perate with the Baltimore

Association for the moral and educational improvement of the colored people for the past year, believing that it is best to unite the few and scattered friends of the cause in our State under one efficient organization.

During the winter, as a Committee of the Meeting for Sufferings, we had several interviews with the City Couneil of Baltimore, and we also presented a memorial to the State Legislature relative to the education of the colored

The Baltimore Association starts the new year with an enlarged field of labor, but with much restricted means. The transfer of the city schools to the School Commissioners of Baltimore has been a great relief, but the demand from the counties for schools has doubled. We hope our State Legislators will see that the prosperity of our State rests upon the virtue and intelligence of all classes and that means will be taken to make education
