The Committee on the Colored Population report that
the Cause of Education amongst the Colored Population
of the State of Maryland make steady progress.
The City of Baltimore has built or fitted up at the
Public expense several new School houses for Colored
pupils the last year and continues to make their
Education a part of the School System of the City.

The Colored Normal School numbers over 200
pupils & is in excellent condition; it has received
for the first time an appropriation from the State of
\$2000 per annum. the application having been
made by our Committee - The State has also
appropriated \$25000 per annum towards the
Colored Schools in the Counties - a large
majority of the Colored Children of the State
are without the opportunity of going to School
and they need all the aid & encouragement which
their friends can render them -
