

that they had visited her, and that she expressed no desire to retain her right of membership with us. the same friends were continued to unite with men friends in preparing a testimony of disownment against her if they should find no cause to forbear and offer it to next meeting.

A certificate was read for Mary Maliner from Gunpowder Monthly Meeting dated 1st Month 6th 1834 which was accepted.

The friends appointed on the request from Philadelphia Monthly Meeting were continued to the service.

The Committee appointed to treat with Margaret Masser and others informed that a visit had not yet been paid. they were continued, with the addition of Ann Waterhouse and Mary Robertson to report to next meeting.

Baltimore preparative Meeting informed that Susanna Gundle has for some time past neglected the attendance of our religious meetings, and acknowledged that she has joined in the separation from our religious society. Judith Williamson and Hannah Stapler were appointed to visit her and report to next meeting.

The Committee appointed reported that they had conferred together and agreed

to propose the reappointment of Grace J. Hopkins for Clerk and the appointment of Judith Williamson for assistant, with which the Meeting united.

Then Adjourned

At Baltimore Monthly Meeting of Women friends for the Eastern and Western Districts (in unity with the Ancient Yearly Meetings of friends) held the 6th of the 3rd Month 1834.

Representatives present except one for whose absence a reason was assigned.

The 3 usual queries with answers from each of our preparative meetings were read and the following adopted to be forwarded to the Quarterly Meeting. We appoint Elizabeth Robertson, Mary Ann Fowler, Ann Waterhouse and Hannah Green our representatives to attend therewith.

Answer: All our Meetings for worship and edification have been kept up and attended by most of our members on first day mornings, but by remissness in the attendance of afternoon and week day meetings, is apparent the hour of meeting nearly observed by most friends, Unbecoming behaviour generally guarded against.
