First Answer. All our meetings for worship and Discipline have been kept up, and generally attended by most of our members on first day mornings, but a remission in the attendance of Afternoon and Week day meetings is apparent, in unbecoming behaviour therein to remark and the hour observed by most friends.

Second Answer. We believe that there are many friends who

are concerned to maintain love towards each other becoming our Christian profession and to discourage tale bearing and detraction, we know of no differences amongst us.

Ninth Answer. Endeavours are used to deal with offenders as the Query directs.

The Committee continued from last month in the case of Margaret Maffey reported that they had had another interview with her and she expressed her willingness to continue with the separatists, and the meeting believing that further labour would not be useful the same friends were continued to unite with men friends in preparing a testimony of disownment against her if they should find no cause to forbear and offer it to next meeting.

The friends continued to deliver the testimonies of disownment produced last month reported the service performed. They were released.

The committee appointed reported they had paid a visit to Susanna Perian and that she manifested no disposition to acknowledge her deviation. Hannah, Eliza and Mary Marsh declined receiving a visit from friends; and they were of the opinion that further labour would not be useful, this meeting being of the judgement that they should be disowned, the same friends were continued to unite with men friends in preparing testimonies of disownment against them if they should
