

ed to the Monthly Meeting, and now rented at \$800.- per annum for a girls school of high grade. The total cost of the improvements made by Thomas Wilson was \$19,000.

2. Lot on Light street, near Hamburg street, 56 x 331 feet, bought 2nd mo 1871 at a cost of \$6,500.- (of which \$3,000.- was contributed by our late friend Miles White, and the balance was paid out of a legacy from our late friend Dr. Thomas G. Edmondson in 1873). The lot is improved by a brick Mission House 42 x 120 feet, built in 1880, at a cost of \$14,600.- including fencing, paving and furnishing. Also, on the rear of the same lot, the five small dwelling houses mentioned in the beginning of this report.

Besides the above mentioned property in Baltimore, the Monthly Meeting is the owner of -

3. the meeting house lot in Ashton, Montgomery Co. Md. comprising half an acre, bought in 1880 for \$145.- and of the frame meeting house thereon, built in the same year at a cost of \$865.-, of which the

Friends living there contributed \$265.- besides hauling materials and labor. This meeting house is now being enlarged at an estimated cost of \$800.-, most of which has been already raised.

4. Lot one acre in Lincoln, Loudoun Co. Va. bought in 1885 for \$100.-, and the brick meeting house thereon, built in 1886, at a cost of \$3,150.- in money, including horse sheds and fencing and furniture; Lincoln Friends contributing about \$300.- in money, and \$700.- in hauling materials, labor, etc. which should be also counted as part of the total cost of the house. There is a debt of \$360.- still remaining on the house
