The Sewing Meeting at Cutaw and Monument sts. has just been re-opened for this season, giving out work to deserving poor.

Bible Schools, are carried on at Cutaw and Monument sts. and at the Mission on First day mornings, and the Mission School has also an afternoon session.

At Cutaw and Monument sts. the average attendance is about 51 scholars, including 3 Bible classes of adults, and 9 teachers and officers. At Light street the average attendance is about 130 scholars in the morning and 10 teachers.

In addition to these distinct lines of effort several different committees are carrying on such work adjunct thereto, as Magic Lantern exhibitions with Gospel views and talks, cottage meetings, showing hospitality to strangers at our meetings, by inviting them to seats &c. There is not a single department of our work that is not capable of extension

with more workers, and many of its branches are crippled for lack of assistance. In view of this, and of the abundant reward which comes to the faithful worker in the field, not only in the final "Well done", but in the daily consciousness of following in the footsteps of our Divine Master, we feel free to urge all the members of our meeting, to consider carefully, whether they are doing all they can; and whether in all these varied fields of labor, there is not something that they ought to do.
