The Mother's Meeting has averaged 60 members, with double the number benefitted.

The prayer meeting continued, and with 75 at the closing meeting, 42 made confession of Christ.

The Household School has had an average attendance of 40 - twice a week, with two regular teachers, and one once a week. General cleaning, bed making, care of dining-room, waiting, and once a week plain cooking have been taught.

Boys Meeting, has averaged 125 scholars, and 24 teachers, with much good accomplished.

A temperance league organized lately, with 60 members is in successful operation and promises to effect much good.
