ville
W. J. Howe.

The following report, regarding Bendersville
Meeting House was read and accepted.

Previous to the Separation of 1827 and 8,
there was a good sized Friends Meeting in

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Monroeville Township, Adams Co. Penna. But at
the Separation hardly any of the members, ex-
cept the Wilson family remained in unity
with us. These had no Meeting House, but met
for a number of years on First-day morning in
their own house. There was no ministry in the
meeting, but they received occasional visits
from travelling Friends. The most frequent
of these, were those of our late dear Friend,
John Scott, whose memory is lovingly cherished
by the younger generation. Owing to deaths
and removals, the little meeting, always very
small, became so depleted, that ten or twelve
years ago it was discontinued. Friends still
occasionally visited the town, and held
meetings in the Methodist Place of worship
at Bendersville. In 1887 Samuel L. Mills
of Western Y. M. attended our Yearly Meeting
with a minute liberating him to visit our
subordinate meetings. Early in 12th month
in company with George L. Scott, he held
some meetings at Bendersville, at which
considerable interest was awakened, and
