during the winter, with an attendance of 60, and the women were much interested in the books read, and the subjects discussed. Much warm clothing was distributed, and at the closing meeting, when Elizabeth Comstock was present, many testified to the good received by them, through this instrumentality.

The Young Folks Union, held its usual monthly meetings, but the attendance was not large, and the advisability of their continuance was referred to the young people of Federal Hill, with instructions for them to act as they deemed best.

The Boys School was continued until 4th mo. 5th. with an average attendance of 11 teachers, and 105 boys. It was reopened for this season's work on 10th mo. 18th. and is also in need of teachers.

The Federal Hill First-day School, was continued through the summer, with an average attendance of 95; and for the year of 117, including 14 officers and teachers.

The Men's Adult Bible class of Jos. P. Elliott, was held for seven months, and much appreciated by its members. The contribution to Foreign Missions from the school for the year was \$55.79.

An Afternoon School, with from 60 to 80 of the younger children was held nine months of the year.

The Young Women's Fellowship Union held four meetings during the year, and a sociable Feb. 4th. The Children's Union under their care held ten meetings, including two teas, and a Christmas entertainment for the Free Kindergarten of South Baltimore. The attendance was about 43, and the interest increased, rather than diminished.

No Cottage Meetings were held, because of sickness in the family of the Chairman. The Temperance Committee, distributed 9000 pages of tracts, and 700 four page papers. Six public addresses were given to audiences ranging from 50 to 400, and much personal work has been done.
