

The Free Kindergarten was conducted from 10th Mo. 15. 1890 to 7th mo. 1st. 1891, at an expense of \$650. ⁰⁰, with two teachers, and 45 of the poorest children of the neighborhood between the ages of 3½ and 6 years. For five days in the week, from 9 till 12½ o'clock, with one meal, they are made happy, and the lessons, which they learned have left their impress, not only upon the children, but the families as well. At Christmas the children gave presents to their parents of articles they had made, or purchased with saved pennies. The work for 1891-92 was begun 9th. Mo. 1st.

The Household School was held twice a week during the winter of 1890-91, with an average attendance of 45. The girls are trained in the principles of household work, and while they are unwilling to go out to work, yet they show in their own homes, that the lessons are carefully learned. The expenses were \$63⁰⁰, which was contributed by the Miles White fund, and a few friends. The school is expected to be continued this

winter, and the Committee would be glad to receive contributions.

The Friends Bible School, Centaw st, report the past year an encouraging one, as notwithstanding considerable sickness, the attendance was steady, with the interest well maintained. There are 4 Bible and 4 Primary Classes, all meeting together at the opening and closing of the school. When the lessons permit, they especially endeavor to enforce the truths held by our Society. The subjects of the ordinances, a free Gospel ministry, and Peace were so treated. The average attendance was 56½.
